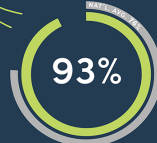


## Muslim-American Views on Climate Change

### Methodology

The Islamic Society of North America (ISNA) worked with researchers to conduct an online survey from a convenience sample of Muslims across the United States to understand their attitudes, perceptions, and behaviors on climate change. The purpose of this survey was to provide a snapshot of the Muslim-American community's attitudes, behaviors, and perceptions on climate change. The survey was conducted from April 10, 2018, to April 15, 2018, and included 1,000 respondents. To help increase the survey's reach, the researchers used the SurveyMonkey platform between April 10, 2018, and May 2, 2018.
